Belief in angels as a pillar of Iman

By the end of the lesson, the learner should be able to explain that belief in angels is one of the pillars of Iman (faith)

Angels and the pillars of Iman

Iman (faith) in Islamic tradition rests on six pillars, one of which is belief in angels. Angels are understood as beings created by Allah from light, who are obedient and carry out specific duties given to them.

This lesson introduces this pillar of faith before naming and learning about specific angels in the lessons that follow.
